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Welcome to Hawes

Hawes is situated at the top of Wensleydale, an area of deep rurality and great natural beauty in the Yorkshire Dales National Park. It is a small market town and civil parish in the district of North Yorkshire, England, granted its market charter in 1699. The parish also includes the neighbouring hamlet of Gayle. The River Ure runs to the north of the town. Hawes is considered one of the 'honeypot' tourist attractions of the Dales, famous for being the home of Wensleydale cheese (produced in the Wensleydale Creamery just next to school) and The Dales Countryside Museum (with which the school has close links). Hawes Primary School is situated just out of the centre of the town, on the main road towards Sedbergh.





Hawes Primary is a small school, part of the YCAT (Yorkshire Collaborative Academy Trust) family of 9 schools and proud to be graded a 'Good' school by Ofsted (Sept 2019). The roll, currently 51 pupils, is divided between 3 classes: Early Years Foundation Stage (Nursery/Reception) and Key Stage 1 (Y1/2); Lower Key Stage 2 (Y3/4); and Upper Key Stage 2 (Y5/6. The school serves the market town of Hawes and surrounding rural areas. Some pupils travel from outside the catchment area. Our senior leadership in school is shared between a full-time Head of School and a part-time Executive Head teacher, who is a headteacher from another YCAT School. This role is sharing best practice and contributing to the wider self-improving school system. Although we are a small school, as part of YCAT, we benefit from the synergy which comes from being part of something bigger. The Trust is built on a passionate belief in collaborative approaches to learning and provides us with a range of expertise, experience, support networks and opportunities to work together. We also regularly join with other small rural primaries in the Wensleydale Cluster to share opportunities, such as sports, cultural events and staff and leaders' networks and training.

Our School History

Hawes school was constructed in 1879, after compulsory education came into force. It was officially opened on 17th February, 1879 and classes started on 21st February. The school was built to accommodate 300 children and in the early days, this number would be on the register.

Although education was compulsory after 1870, it did not become free until 1891; school fees had to be paid a week in advance, and children were refused admission if this was not paid in advance and their parents prosecuted. Absenteeism was rife, which was probably due to financial hardship and not all parents were keen to pay fees, when a child might be earning money. The school was closed many times due to contagious diseases such as measles, scarlet fever, influenza and typhoid.

In 2016, Hawes Primary School left the North Yorkshire Local Authority to join the Yorkshire Collaborative Academy Trust (YCAT) with Bilton Grange, Lothersdale, Askwith



and Leyburn Primary Schools. This year, YCAT has increased in size to 9 schools with the addition of Bradleys Both Primary, Darley & Summerbridge and Threshfield.

Admission to School

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Our admission limit for 2024/25 is 15. We usually admit children who are 5 at the beginning of the Autumn Term each September. However, children moving to the area may be admitted at other times during the school year. We provide nursery places for 3- and 4-year olds. These 3-hour sessions are offered 5 mornings a week in Class 1. Parents may have five free sessions a week from the autumn term following their child's third birthday. Pupils entering school for the first time are given a personalised and sensitive induction programme in the Foundation class to ensure we meet each child's needs.

Literacy **Mathematics**

We plan exciting learning opportunities for our youngest children, both indoors and outdoors. Learning is often child-led and through play. Sometimes learning is more adult focused and everybody works together e.g. learning a song. Phonics, reading, writing and maths are generally taught in small groups with children of similar ability working together. We teach children to read through the 'Phonics Bug' programme of systematic synthetic phonics. We very much value the good relationships we have with parents and carers. It is our aim for children to settle in and feel secure as soon as possible.

Key Stages 1 and 2

At Key Stage 1 (Year 1 and Year 2) and Key Stage 2 (Year 3 to Year 6), children are taught the National Curriculum through our own Hawes Curriculum. This is a knowledge-based approach which is adapted to meet the context and needs of our own school and its families.

Equal Opportunities

Everyone at Hawes Primary School works to deliver equal opportunities to all. We believe that inclusion, integration, access and support are the right of all individuals without exception.

Provision for Sport

We provide a wide range of games and PE experiences at school for the children. When possible, we join together with other cluster schools to offer further sporting options. We also supplement children's PE experience by working in liaison with Chris Bullock Sports who provide expert lessons weekly across school, plus other expert providers such as for Yoga and Zumba. Swimming lessons take place for all the children in Y3 - Y6 in the Autumn Term.

Special Needs (SEND)

Mrs Marwood is our Special Needs Coordinator. If you have any questions or concerns, they can be discussed with her.

We recognise that the needs and abilities of individual children differ widely. These needs are identified and catered for. We also recognise that children develop at a differing pace throughout their school lives. A child with special needs is one who has been identified as experiencing difficulties which may be temporary or longer term. All children work towards targets through learning steps at the level appropriate for them.

Our Governing Body is responsible for seeing that children with special needs receive the best possible support and provision. The designated Governor for SEND is Abbie Rhodes. More information can be found in our SEND policy available via the school website, or ask in school.

Religious Education and Collective Worship

As a school we follow NYC guidelines on collective worship. We have an assembly every day which has a broadly Christian element or themed approach following aspects of the social, moral, cultural and spiritual curriculum. Our local Vicar comes into school regularly and participate in our assemblies. RE is taught according to the NYC agreed syllabus which provides an enabling and supportive framework for planning and teaching. Parents are reminded that they may withdraw their child from collective acts of worship and religious education by writing formally to the Head of School.

At Hawes Primary school we endeavour to provide a range of lunchtime and afterschool activities and clubs which cater for a variety of interests. This year's extracurricular clubs include Multi-sports, Yoga, Zumba, Gardening, Games Club, Library and Mindfulness Colouring. Additionally, we organise a two-year cycle of residential school trips for children in Years 3/4 and 5/6.

Absence from School

In line with Department for Education guidance regarding school attendance please note the following:

- 1. If your child is absent from school for any reason you must to inform the school as soon as possible (normally on the first day of absence). A telephone call, message on our Scholarpack, ParentApp, e-mail or personal contact is acceptable.
- 2. The law requires the school to approve the absence of any child. If the school has not approved the absence then it will be recorded in the register as unauthorised.
- 3. The school day begins at 9am and children are encouraged to arrive from 8.45am. Pupils arriving late cause disruption to their own and others' learning. Please ensure your child is present for registration by 9am otherwise they may be marked as late.
- 4.

Absence - Holidays

- 1 A completed absence form is required for *all* absences requested.
- 2 Department for Education, LA and YCAT rules are clear that term time absence for any holiday can only be authorised by the Head of School in exceptional circumstances. A written application explaining the exceptional circumstances must be given to the Head of School via the form available from the school website or office and you are encouraged to discuss any request in advance with the Head of School.

We hope you will help us in our efforts to minimise unauthorised absence, lateness and in keeping accurate registers. Please see our website for more information - visit the Attendance & Absence page under the Parents tab on the front page at: www.hawesprimary.co.uk.

Behaviour

We actively promote a positive attitude to behaviour at school. This should be immediately evident by the positive atmosphere you experience on entry to our premises. We expect all children to behave appropriately both inside and outside of school.

Nevertheless, on the rare occasion when any incidents of inappropriate behaviour occur which may cause concern, the parents of those pupils will be contacted. Please see our Behaviour Policy (via the school website or ask in school for more information).

We have as few rules as possible to promote an easily understood and uniform approach to school life.

1. Be safe, kind and helpful.

- 2. Engage in your learning and use your time well.
- 3. Listen to others and follow instructions politely.
- 4. Be respectful to everyone and all property.

Home School Agreement

Parents/carers have a vital role to play in the education of their children and we aim from the beginning to foster positive home-school links. You will be asked to sign a Home / School Agreement when your child starts school. This briefly outlines how we will help you and how you can support us.

We respect parents'/carers' views and aim to work closely together for the mutual benefit of the children. We have an open-door policy and regard our parents as partners. Please talk to class teachers or the Head of School whenever you feel it is necessary. Also, please take the opportunity to discuss good things as well as the occasional matter of concern.

Homework

We believe that a regular, small amount of homework helps our pupils to make better progress and enables you as parents and carers to share quality time on learning at home whilst supporting them. This shows children that their parents and teachers work closely together for their benefit.

We place great importance upon children reading at home throughout their time in school and, as they progress through school, also learning times tables and spellings through practice at home. Children are encouraged to bring resources and information from home to enrich their school lessons. Pupils will need a bag to transport their reading books, reading record and any homework to and from school.

Insurance

YCAT has taken out a policy with the Department for Education for personal accident insurance for all our children engaged on activities in or out of school. The schedule with limits of liability and range of cover is available for inspection in school.

School Dinners / Lunchtime

School dinners are made on-site in our school canteen. They cost £3.10 per day (free for children in R – Y2) Payment is due on the first day of the school week. You may pay for the half term if you prefer. Payment must be made in advance using Parentpay- there is a link to this on our website - www.hawesprimary.co.uk

We are responsible for children who have lunch at school, whether a school lunch or sandwiches. Pupils are well supervised and may only leave school premises during the lunch break if parents/carers let us know in advance and then also sign their child out and tell a member of staff as they take their child.

Medicines

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Please do not send medicines to school with your child without consulting Mrs Alderson in the office as appropriate procedures must be followed and forms completed and signed. In most instances we can accommodate a parent/carer's and child's needs. However, this cannot be assumed as the provision of medicine must be done to the highest standards of safety and comfort for all concerned.

Medical and Dental Care

Periodically, all children are examined in school by NHS Medical Staff. You are entitled to be present at these examinations.

Photographic Permission

We take a lot of photos in school every week. This helps us to share what we do and keep a record of the children's development and experiences. We will ask for your written permission to take your child's photograph for use in school, on displays, in the prospectus, in the media, on our school Facebook Page and the school website. You will be given a consent form before your child starts school.

School Office

The School Office is run by our Administrator, Mrs Alderson. Mrs Alderson is usually the best person to approach initially if you have any questions. She will try to help you with anything you need relating to school. If your child is a new starter, please be assured you will get a very friendly welcome from her.

School Uniforms

Children from Reception to year 6 wear school uniform, as follows.

Houses

We have had school houses at Hawes for many years. It is a part of our long history. Families are allocated a House on joining school. Each has its own coloured polo shirt. The houses compete in our annual sports day.

The houses are: **Hill** (red), **Fell** (blue), **Dale** (green) Our uniform comprises: Navy blue Hawes Primary School sweatshirt. Hawes School polo shirt in house colours - royal blue (Fell), red (Hill) or green (Dale) Navy or plain black trousers/shorts or skirts. Shorts should be trouser shorts - not sports shorts / cycling shorts.



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House coloured checked gingham dresses may be worn in summer and school baseball caps which can protect heads from the sun are also available.

Shoes, **not trainers**, should be worn. In bad weather, boots or wellingtons may be worn to school but pupils will be expected to change into their shoes or pumps once inside.

Please make sure to label or name all clothing so that misplaced items can be returned to the right children.

In PE children must wear plain navy or black shorts or leggings/tracksuit bottoms and plain white t -shirts / polo shirts.

They should have trainers or pumps to wear.

Jewellery should not be worn to school as it is a potential hazard at playtimes and in PE. If Children have their ears pierced then they may wear simple, small stud earrings but only if they are able to remove and replace them independently for all sports, PE and swimming.

Please note the school cannot take any responsibility for any lost jewellery.

School uniform is available online. Please refer to the school website for the link.

Sometimes parents donate uniform in good condition to school that their child has outgrown. Please speak with Mrs Alderson in the office for more details about this.

Sex and Relationships Education

Sex education is delivered through the Science and PSHE curriculum. We are always confident of being able to respond appropriately to children's needs and questions. The children are taught to have a healthy respect for their own bodies as well as those of other people in the same way that they are taught to have clean teeth, and not cause distress to other children by

unkindness or bullying.

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Lessons are presented with due regard to moral considerations and the value of family life. Where guestions of a sexual nature arise naturally, possibly from play in the home corner, answers are given by the class teacher appropriate to the understanding and emotional development of the child.

'Growing Up' lessons for Y5/6 children in the summer term, during which aspects of our life cycle (puberty) is taught in a sensitive manner with opportunities for pupils to ask related guestions. Parents/carers will be informed before these lessons take place and may consent to or decline their child's participation.

Transport to School

Assistance with transport is given by the Education Committee to those children of primary age (i.e. from the beginning of the term in which the child reaches the age of 5) who live 2 or more miles from school. Sometimes in special circumstances concessionary transport is provided for children who live less than the statutory mileage from school. Details can be obtained from school.

Voluntary Contributions

Under the terms of the Education Reform Act 1988, we are permitted to ask for voluntary contributions for such activities as visits to places of educational value and extra school activities such as visiting theatre groups, swimming, residential trips etc. Inability or unwillingness to contribute does not prevent a child from taking part in the activities but if insufficient voluntary contributions are received then the activities may not take place.

Where the parents/carers of a pupil are in receipt of Income Support or Family Tax Credit please feel able to approach the Headteacher in confidence so that the situation can be discussed and arrangements made.

Parents/carers may also be asked to pay for any damage caused wilfully by any pupil.

Complaints Procedure

If you have any complaint about our work in school, firstly, it is important to let us know about your concern as soon as possible. Often problems are dealt with more quickly if they are handled informally. Contact the school office and ask who the best person would be to talk to. This may be your child's class teacher. Most teachers will be in the classroom for a lot of the working day but you can arrange for them to phone you back or arrange to see them as soon as possible. Plan what you would like to say to the teacher before the appointment, i.e. your main concern, how you would like the school to help, what you would like to happen after you have told the school of your concern. If you are not happy with the outcome please speak to the Headteacher and give the school enough time to investigate thoroughly. If you feel that the school has not dealt with the problem satisfactorily you will need to contact a governor in person or write to the Clerk to the Governors, Dominique Adams.
